CESD has a number of supports in place, including a proactive program called "YES". YES stands for Youth Empowerment and Support. YES impacts all students in kindergarten through Grade 8.

YES "success coaches" go into all K-8 classrooms many times each school year to promote awareness of mental health protective factors and enhance social and emotional development. Success coaches also create programming and activities at schools - often in the form of a lunchtime or after school club - that encourage positive self-esteem, confidence and coping skills. The

- Our bus drivers transport 3,957 students safely to and from school each day?
- Chinook's Edge has 117 bus drivers and 30 spare bus drivers.
- Our buses travel 2,629,375 kilometers per year. That's enough kilometers to travel around the earth's equator 65.5 times!

Also, did you know, our bus drivers and transportation department ensure all school buses and their riders go through safety drills twice each year (as you can see in the photo)? That's to ensure everyone knows what to do in case of an emergency.
