

Innisfail High and Sundre High students learn about rural healthcare professions





A key factor to success was the community support, with a wide range of healthcare workers from each community being willing and available to talk with students about their work. The healthcare workers showed students what they do in their jobs every day and let the students try things out. Activities included practicing stitches to learning about the work of emergency services.


