<u>The Board has approved a \$136.8 million budget</u> for the 2023-24 school year. The Board approved the budget at its May 31, 2023 meeting.

Jordan-Fenton read from her books, helping students learn more about residential schools in age appropriate ways. The Board supports schools in their efforts to help students learn more about Indigenous history, culture and people.

The Board congratulates Ecole Fox Run School and staff and students for <u>successfully hosting the Alberta</u> <u>Francophone Games</u>. About 550 grade 7 to 12 Francophone and French Immersion students, from 60 Alberta schools, attended the event. Students participated in a variety of sports, cultural and social activities.
